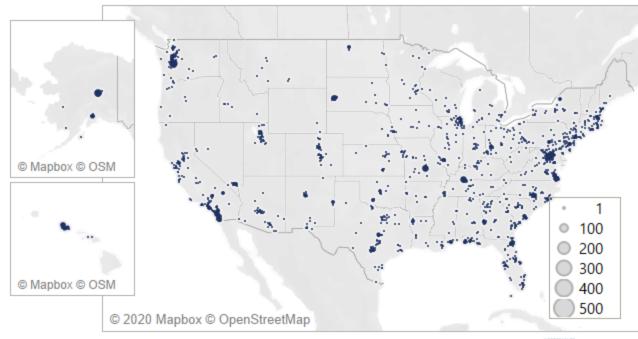

Week 6: Spotlight on School-Aged Children



Overall Takeaway: This crisis has underscored vulnerabilities pertaining to families who have children with unique needs and those without the means to support a high-tech education for their child(ren) from home. Despite nationwide attention unrelated to military affiliation, these issues have seen little improvement since the start of polling.

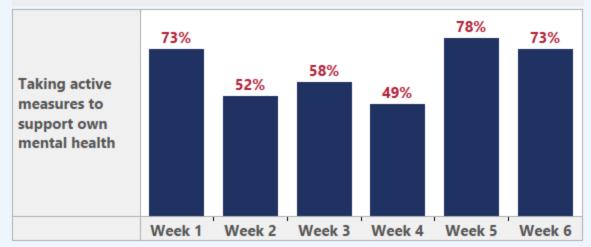

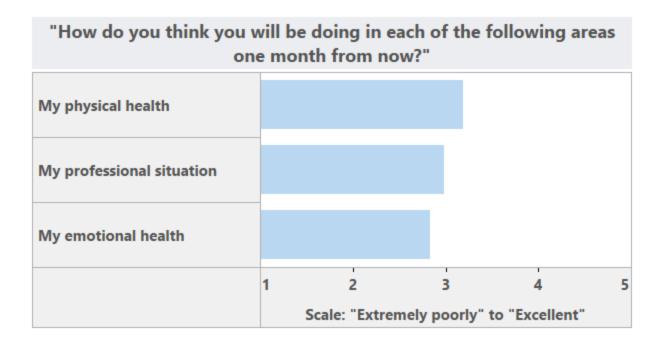

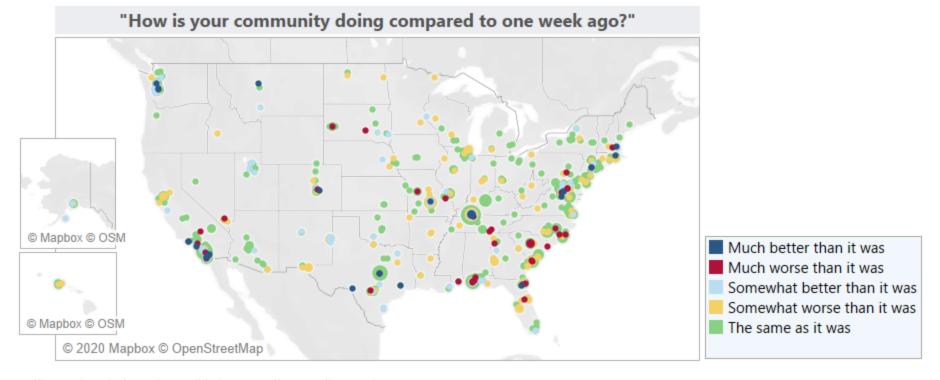
